  - Increasing the number of 25-34 year olds have a bachelor degree or above
  - Increasing access for low socio-economic students
- Quality improvement initiatives

- Promotion of Excellence in Learning and Teaching in Higher Education Program
  - University-led projects
  - Australian Awards for University Teaching
  - Collaboration and partnerships

## Improving regulation

Australia's regulatory framework is based on a standards and risk based approach

- It consists of the following elements
  - Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF)
  - the Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA)
  - Higher Education Standards Framework
  - Higher Education Standards Panel
  - Education Services for Overseas Students Act 2000 (ESOS)

### Australian Qualifications Framework

- National policy for qualifications from each sector
- protects quality, international recognition and reputation
- Makes qualifications comparable
- Knowledge and skills of graduates
- Managed and maintained by the AQF Council

# Sets out for each qualification level:

- knowledge and skills
- volume of learning and
- learning outcomes

# The Tertiary Education quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA)

- Australia's independent regulator of higher education
- Registration, accreditation, regulation and quality assurance for all higher education providers, including universities
- Maintains the National Register of Higher Education Providers
- Engagement with quality assurance agencies and relevant government bodies in other countries

# The Higher Education Standards Framework

- The Framework is comprised of:
  - Provider Registration Standards
  - Provider Category Standards
  - Provider Course Accreditation Standards
  - Qualification Standards

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
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
### Global Growth of International Students
